Wendy Stockdale: It is with deep sadness that we heard this week that Wendy Stockdale (our very own 'Lady Hatherton') has passed away. A dearly loved member of staff and friend of the school for over 35 years, investing her life and love in the school from 1975 to 2010. We all have very happy memories of Wendy and the special person she was. Our thoughts and prayers are with her husband Ernie, and the rest of the family (including Pickles).

Diocesan Team Visit: This week saw a team of National Leaders of Education visit Shanklin on behalf of the Diocese, in preparation for the change to Academy status in September. I was really proud to showcase your children and the really great teaching and learning that goes on, day in, day out. The team (including a former regional inspector) freely used the judgement "Outstanding" which is not something that is done lightly by such experienced professionals! Good and Outstanding behaviour of pupils; much Good and Outstanding Teaching and Learning: Outstanding rapport between adults and children; Extremely good targeting of learning to the needs of children (which they commented on as being unusual!); and excellent organisationally in terms of policies and procedures. Yes, we still have things to work on - effective use of data on pupil progress; internal communication systems; and coherence of the quality delivery of the curriculum that is already there, so that the whole learning journey from preschool to high school ties together better. But they highlighted nothing that we were not already aware of, and nothing that we can't easily fix! Their clear view is that we have in place what is necessary for rapid and sustained improvement. One focus that they promised would take a high priority is investment in the building to bring the facilities up to the standard needed to enhance the learning of your children, something that we have been pushing for and will support in any way possible.

Red Nose Day Thank you to all of you who did something funny for money and gave so generously. Some children in the afternoon gave all their spare change even though they weren't buying anything! Very kind and generous - Thank you! All together, we raised a grand total of over £380 last Friday. Once again a huge thank you to everyone who made it possible!




## Puzzle of the week:

The "Oyle o' Woyte" dialect and other regional accents do provide a rich heritage, but when it comes to grammar, pronunciation and spelling, it can cause errors that lose marks and lower grades!

## Common grammatical errors that lose marks in Literacy:

I done .... (also he/she/we/they done...). Correct to I did or I have done.

I aint (I haven't)

...could have / would have / should have. Not could of / should of / would of ... Or- for those who correctly use apostrophes - could've / should've / would've is OK too!

Incorrect tenses: eg We were...They were... NOT We was... /They was... (or wasn't!)

I was / He was / She was... not I were... / He were... / She were...

"I do but he doesn't"... not "I does, but he don't"! "Bit", not "bited", & "fought", not "fighted" etc!

Is it "I" or "Me"? "Me and Charlotte"; "Charlotte and me"?... Change to "Charlotte and I" -

try removing the other people from the sentence and see if "I", or "me" by itself, makes sense. eq 1. Charlotte and I went to the garden?

("I went to the garden" not "Me went to the garden")

eg 2. "Thanks for meeting with Bob and me yesterday" NOT "Thanks for meeting with Bob and I yesterday"

("Thanks for meeting with me yesterday" not "Thanks for meeting with I yesterday")

Different from... not Different than... or Different to -

Combinations of the above.... eg "We wasn't doin' nuffin!" (including double negatives) "In fact, I aint NEVER done nuffin!" (and triples!)

**Pronunciation errors** that can lead to spelling errors. We need to take care to pronounce and accurately articulate words despite our natural accents!) Janartameen? Do you know what I mean?

#### V instead of TH

F instead of TH

eg Feather not Fevver Clothes not Cloves
Brother not Brovver Then not Ven

Three not Free Thought not Fort
Think not Fink Thanks not Fanks!

Bother not Bovver

Droppin' the g from "...ing" words

eg Runnin', doin', (or not doin') etc.

Glottle stop - dropping the t from words (eg bottle, accurate, I gotta go, The ca' sa' on the ma' etc)

# Articulating <u>all</u> phonemes eg.

Arctic - not Artic Perhaps - not praps around - not 'round

February - not febry Escape - not excape Library - not libry Often - not offen

Slippery - not slippy or slippry Vulnerable - not Vunrable

Americanisms: An other / Another - NOT a Nother (as in a whole nother list of errors!) Mixing "Your" and "You're" (belonging to you) & (you are); "Its" (belonging to it) and "It's" (contraction of "it is" or "it has"); "There"/"They're"/"Their"; (not here or anywhere else / they are / belonging to them, respectively).


Comparatives and superlatives - eg comparing 2 = taller/shorter; comparing 3 or more = tallest/shortest

Who/whom - The teachers chose the pupil who was best suited to the role.

The coach asked the players whom they liked best.

If you can answer 'he' = who (he was best suited)

If you can answer "him" = whom (they liked him best)
